Goals for the Workshop

We are offering this workshop to help Girl Scouts across the country earn their My Promise, My Faith pin. Whether you are Christian (Lutheran or another denomination), another faith, or you do not identify with any particular faith tradition, we hope you will use this workshop as a launch pad to discuss what you believe and how those beliefs relate to the Girl Scout Law.

Who We Are

Epiphany Lutheran Church is a Reconciling in Christ congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). More information on Epiphany can be found at www.elcserves.org

What we believe:

- We believe strongly that all persons have valuable stories and infinite worth.
- We seek to ensure that the WHOLE Body of Christ receives nourishment: the nourishment of food, and of love, and of welcome, and of support, and of respect.
- As members of Epiphany Lutheran Church, we welcome you regardless of gender identity, sexual orientation, race, culture, addictions, physical or mental health, imprisonment, socio-economic circumstances, or anything that too often divides us. Everyone who gathers here is expected and encouraged to share in the sacramental and general life of this congregation. We pledge to ourselves and to all others that we will strive to live as a reconciling people, in our life together and in our outreach to the world.

Your hosts for the event are **Jennifer Slagle Peck**, Girl Scout Leader in the Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital, and **Pastor David Slagle Peck** of Epiphany Lutheran Church. Our special guest is **Bishop Leila Ortiz** of the Metropolitan DC Synod of the ELCA. See bios below for more information.

What to do Before the Workshop

1. Print the following materials:
 - a. **The Welcome Packet** (this document)
 - b. **My Promise, My Faith Booklet** (suggest stapling along the left side either before or after the workshop; can print two pages to a page to make it half size)
 - c. **My Promise, My Faith Worksheets** (these will be used with the booklet and with the swap activity; suggest printing on different color paper if you have it)
2. Read Bio of Bishop Leila Ortiz (see below) and, if your scout would like, submit a question for Bishop Ortiz by emailing Jennifer at jaslagle@gmail.com. Please include your scout's first name, scout level and troop number, and which Girl Scout Council you are from. A varied selection of questions will be posed to Bishop Ortiz during the workshop.
3. Gather materials that will be needed during the workshop.
 - a. Scissors
 - b. Glue stick (or other glue to add information to your booklet)
 - c. Writing utensils
 - d. You can join us in making a swap in one of the following ways (or do more than one!):
 - i. **Safety Pin Swap** – large safety pin, three pony beads (or any beads that will fit on a safety pin), piece of paper to write a short message or picture to include on your safety pin.
 - ii. **Bracelet** – piece of string or yarn that will fit around your wrist, three pony beads (or any beads that you like!).
 - iii. **Friendship Rocks** – three rocks, supplies to paint your rocks.
4. Review and agree to the terms of the Girl Scout “Parental Permission Single Activity Form” available at www.gscnc.org.¹ Your participation in the workshop is an acknowledgement of parental permission to attend.

Bishop Leila Ortiz



The Rev. Leila M. Ortiz is a pastor and theologian in The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and serves as the Bishop of The Metropolitan Washington D.C. Synod since September of 2019. She works alongside pastors, councils, and church members as they discern their call in the church for the sake of the world. Leila joined the synod staff in 2016 as Assistant to the Bishop.

Leila is also a doctoral candidate at United Lutheran Theological Seminary of Pennsylvania with a concentration in Systematic/Contemporary Theology. Her areas of interest are Protestant Latinx Liberation Theologies in the United States and the impact of Latina hermeneutics and spirituality on Lutheran ecclesiology.

Given her particular perspective and call to the church, in the fall of 2012 Leila served as a representative from the United States at The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) Global Theological Consultation in Wittenberg, Germany, to assess Lutheran heritage and the Reformation in defining what it means to be Lutheran in a fast-changing world. She served in this capacity again at the 2016 consultation in Geneva, Switzerland.

Leila is an alumna of the 2015 Lewis Fellowship sponsored by the Lewis Center of Church Leadership of Wesley Theological Seminary. She is also an alumna of A Convocation of Christian Leaders, a series of four gatherings designed for promising young leaders from around the country who seek extended conversation about the theology and practice of leadership in Christian institutions hosted by Leadership Education of Duke Divinity.

Jennifer Slagle Peck

Jennifer Slagle Peck was involved in Girl Scouts as a child and has been a volunteer Girl Scout Leader in the Girl Scout's Council for the Nation's Capital since 2017. She is a full-time attorney, working in consumer finance law for a federal agency. She is also on the Synod Council for the Metropolitan DC Synod of the ELCA and is a registered yoga teacher.

Rev. David Slagle Peck

Pastor Dave Slagle Peck has served as pastor of Epiphany since 2014. He attended the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg (now United Seminary), spending a year studying in Washington, DC through the ecumenical Washington Consortium and interned outside of Sioux Falls, SD. He also serves as the chair of the worship team for the Metropolitan Washington, DC Synod and is a member of the board of directors of Greater DC Diaper Bank.

Inclusion and diversity – As Christ's church, we value the richness of God's creation and offer a radical welcome to all people, appreciating our common humanity and our differences. We are a church that does not view diversity as a barrier to unity. We recognize and will challenge dynamics of power and privilege that create barriers to participation and equity in this church and society – for women, people of color, minority ethnic groups, people with disabilities, people who are marginalized or living in poverty, and the LGBTQ community.

Courage and openness to change – Because we trust in God's promise and understand faith to be a living, daring confidence in God's grace, we are emboldened to embrace learning and change in our spiritual and institutional journey as church. This means we are open to new ways and willing to take risks to discover God's plan for this church.

Faithful stewardship of God's creation and gifts – As church together, faithful stewardship is about holding to God's purpose and ensuring the responsibilities and resources that God has entrusted to us are used with great care and with accountability to God, to each other and those served by this church.
