'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

Forgiveness

Ephesians 4:32

Courageously Defying Boundaries

On and on and on, the Bible presents heroic characters who vary from traditional gender roles, challenge ethnic stereotypes, and offer a richer understanding of God in this world.

Deborah the Judge (Judges 5:2-31 - Song of Deborah)

A great role model for all those called to lead, Deborah, “held court under the Palm of Deborah...and the Israelites went up to her to have their disputes decided.” (Judges 4:5). As the only female judge mentioned in the Bible, Deborah is known for being a compassionate leader (of which there weren't many in Biblical times). One of the hallmarks of Deborah's leadership is her willingness to follow God's call and to give God the credit rather than leading out of her own strength. The song of Deborah reminds us that in the battles of life, we are not alone or unaided.

The churches in Rome (Romans 16:1-16); Euhodia and Syntyche (Philippians 4:1-9)

Pairs of female emissaries like Tryphaina and Tryphosa (Romans 16:12) and Euhodia and Syntyche (Phil. 4:1) who preached the gospel, to Phoebe, a deacon who also financially supported Paul and others in ministry, to Andronicus and Junia who were imprisoned for their faith, women were engaged in ways that were usually reserved for men.

Mark 7:24-35 – Jesus and the Syrophenician woman

“Lord,” she replied, “even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.” (Mark 7:28) This is a remarkable story of ethnic and cultural boundary crossing, courage, and vulnerability that not only heals a woman's daughter but transforms Jesus' understanding of his own ministry!

Strong Women

From positions of power and from the margins, from the young and from the old, there are numerous examples of women in the Bible who demonstrated strength and courage in the face of social, cultural, and religious traditions and norms that left them vulnerable.

Queen Esther

“For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father’s family will perish. And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?” (Esther 4:14)

Esther rose from an orphan to queen. To become queen, she needed to hide her Jewish identity. She overcame fear, risked her position and privilege, and found the courage to advocate and save her people from genocide.

Ruth

“Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die—there will I be buried.” (Ruth 1:16-17)

Ruth refused to leave her mother-in-law Naomi after her husband and his brothers and father died. It was almost certain that staying with Naomi would lead to both of them living in poverty, and yet she refused to leave Naomi to suffer alone. Ruth was humble and kind, but also bold and strong. She is praised for her great loyalty, faithfulness, and love.

Mary of Nazareth (Luke 1:46-55 - Mary’s Song)

Mary’s all-important role in the Bible goes without saying - she was the mother of Jesus, but it was her faith and courage, from the first encounter with the angel Gabriel to her final moments with Jesus at the cross (Matthew 27:56) and with the apostles in the upper room as they discerned what was to come (Acts 1:14) that is so captivating. Her song speaks of a God not of the powerful and well connected, but of the marginalized and struggling.

Anna (Luke 2:36-38)

An 84-year-old prophetess, Anna recognizes Jesus as the Messiah and became one of the first Christian missionaries, going forth to share the good news of Jesus. In just three sentences, the life of Anna is shown to be an extraordinary journey of trust and devotion, overflowing with her love for God. She devoted her whole life to trusting in God’s provision and her long years of waiting were rewarded by being able to gaze upon the face of Jesus.

Hymn of Courage and Strength

Lift Every Voice and Sing by James Weldon Johnson and J. Rosamond Johnson
The hymn is a prayer of thanksgiving that evokes images of the biblical Exodus from slavery into the freedom of the "promised land" and is sung in churches across North America. It is often called the Black National Anthem.


